Mayor Larry Di Ianni urges the community to combat ugly intolerance of minority groups

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An ancient Roman historian once said, "Small communities grow great through harmony, great ones fall to pieces through discord." It is a statement I take to heart as your mayor. It is a message that should move us all to do some self-examination of our own actions and relationships in our work and daily lives.

Harmony is a value we may not readily recognize as an intrinsic component to building strong communities.

Many of us have settled in Hamilton because we appreciate the attributes of this community that other cities or other countries don't have -- freedom, peace, prosperity and safety to name a few. Hamiltonians have a tremendous spirit of community, a fervent civic pride and a genuine concern for their neighbours' well-being. Harmony is at the core of those attributes.

Then why do we have a portion of our community fearing for its safety? Why is the insidious term "hate crimes" on the lips of many of our residents and community leaders?

Recently, I called an emergency meeting of the members of Strengthening Hamilton's Community Initiative (SHCI). It was an opportunity to bring these community leaders together to share their expertise on combating racism and hate crimes in our community following an attack on one of our local businessmen.

The assault was a terrible incident, a stain on our collective community values. It was an appalling event that sent shock waves through our community, and particularly the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (GLBT) community and the communities of colour.

The lessons learned from that SHCI meeting were clear. The bonds of community harmony have been shaken by ignorance of and hostility toward a segment of our community that makes up Hamilton's rich mosaic -- the GLBT community. A lack of understanding and ignorance of the GLBT community has escalated into subtle and outright hostility.

Let me categorically state that Hamilton's civic and community leaders will not tolerate hatred in any form. Violence that stems from intolerance is clearly offensive to this community's sensibilities. Hamilton is a community for all people in all of their diversities.

We, as a community, must foster acceptance and through education and understanding, generate an environment of safety and harmony. We must tackle the root causes of racism and discrimination and work towards their elimination before prejudices and ignorance escalate into aberrant behaviours.

I particularly implore our city's youth and leaders of our youth to help eradicate hatred from our community. With greater awareness and education of the diverse cultures, religions, sexual orientations, racial and ethnic roots our citizens bring to Hamilton, our youth will grow with that knowledge and help promote harmony in our community. As an impressionable segment of society and as future community leaders, our youth needs to have access to unbiased information on all segments of our diverse community.

I also invite community members, community groups, businesses and educators to come together to celebrate Hamilton's diversity. With greater mutual understanding we will have the collective power to find solutions to combat the ugly manifestations of ignorance and intolerance in our community.

This is a call to action. I am asking each and every one of you to do your part -- at home, in your personal life, at work and in the community, to promote and celebrate a greater awareness and understanding of our diverse community.

I am very heartened by the willingness of so many community members and groups who have already come together to promote harmony in our community.

It will take the effort and commitment of all of us - every single resident, every worker, every student - to make Hamilton a vibrant and harmonious community that values our diversity.

From greater harmony will grow a greater community.
