4. WELCOME

LYLA: Welcome to the First Unitarian Church of Hamilton.

My name is Lyla Miklos and along with Kelly Wolf we will be your Service Leaders this morning on this Flower Communion Sunday.

Our speaker today is the Reverend Fred Cappuccino. Rev. Cappuccino has been a Unitarian minister for 45 years. Now retired, he and his wife Bonnie are the cofounders and directors of Child Haven International, which cares for over a thousand formerly destitute children in India, Nepal, Tibet, and Bangladesh. Fred and Bonnie jointly received the Order of Canada in 1996 for their humanitarian

work. You will have two opportunities to make contributions towards Child Haven this morning. Rev. Cappuccino has brought several unique items from India to silent auction. They are on display in the lobby and bids will be taken until Noon today. You can also make special donations into our offertory basket by placing your donations into the envelopes found in your printed Orders of Service which say Child Haven.

We are blessed in this congregation with wonderful music and today is no exception. Our Music Ministry today will be provided by Our Choir, led by our Choir Director Cindy Carey with accompaniment provided by our Music Director Rachel Derry.

The Unitarian Universalist Flower Communion service was created by Rev. Norbert Capek, who founded Czechoslovakia's first Unitarian Church. He first presented this service in 1923, to bind people from various religious traditions more closely together. Capek's wife, Maja who was ordained in 1926 brought the Flower Communion to the US in 1940.

The significance of the flower communion is that as no two flowers are alike, so no two people are alike, yet each has a contribution to make. Together the different flowers form a beautiful bouquet. Our common bouquet would not be the same without the unique addition of each individual flower, and thus it is with our church community, it would not be the same without each and every one of us. Thus this service is a statement of our community. By exchanging flowers, we show our willingness to walk together in our search for truth, disregarding all that might divide us.

Each person takes home a flower brought by someone else - thus symbolizing our shared celebration in community. This communion of sharing is essential to a free people of a free reliaion.

Now please rise if you are able and join us in welcoming our Children's Flower Communion Processional by singing hymn #361 from your grey hymnal "Enter, Rejoice and Come In".

5. CHILDREN'S FLOWER COMMUNION PROCESSIONAL/CHALICE LIGHTING

[NOTE: Fire carrier enters first, followed by the Sound carriers (singing bowl), (drum carrier if there is one) Water carriers (vases with a bit of water in them) and finally Flower carriers (baskets of the congregant's flowers). They will process up the aisle of the church to the front. The Fire Carrier will light the chalice, the sound carriers will place the singing bowl in position, the Water Carriers will place the vases on one of the plinths and finally the Flower Carriers will place the flowers into the vases, assisted by the other children. The children will sit in the front row if they are comfortable sitting there.]

ADULT CONGREGANTS: Help us as parents, as teachers, and as church members to give our children love, encouragement, and guidance that is steadfast, sure,

and true. May we guide them and teach them in the ways of knowledge, justice, and compassion that they may grow in stature and wisdom. May we inspire our children in their hopes and aspirations, and may we listen to them in their fears and concerns. Save us and restore us from those moments when we know that we fail.

YOUTH AND CHILDREN: We resolve to deliver to future generations a world of greater peace, justice, harmony, and beauty. A world that is more full of life.

ALL: We rejoice in our fellowship as a community of faith, which we signify this morning in our gathering of flowers. Keep us steadfast in our covenant that by the testimony of our lives we may declare the saving power of our faith.

11. MEDIATION IN WORDS

Our Meditative Reading comes from Rev. Norbert Capek.

Just before he was put to death in Dachau, a Nazi Concentration Camp in Germany, he wrote this prayer, reflecting on his own life and the state of his spirit:

It is worthwhile to live and fight courageously for sacred ideals. Oh blow ye evil winds into my body's fire; my soul you'll never unravel.

Even though disappointed a thousand times or fallen in the fight and everything would worthless seem, I have lived amidst eternity.

Be grateful, my soul, My life was worth living. He who was pressed from all sides but remained victorious in spirit is welcomed into the choir of heroes.

He who overcame the fetters giving wing to the mind is entering into the golden age of the victorious.

Maybe we will never see them face-to-face, or touch their hands. But we can still warm our hands on their hearts, because we know that their hopes are like our hopes, their pain is like our pain, their love like our love.

16. ONE LAST CANDLE

[Kelly will light the "Last Candle"]

KELLY: I lit one last candle for all those joys and sorrows, which remain in our hearts until the time comes to speak them aloud. Whatever our level of sharing, may this community be a blessing and support to us all.

Please join me in reading our unison words of support, which are printed in your order of service.

ALL: Our path is open to all life – to the 10,000 joys and 10,000 sorrows. We find it difficult but we are not alone. And through the experience of reaching out in

connectedness to others, we heal, are free to love fully, and realize a profound sense of belonging.
