After winning the Maggie for best journalist in arts and culture, Lyla Miklos described the experience as overwhelming.

"To win an award for doing something that you love is [...] the cherry on top of the sundae," said Miklos while proudly holding her award.

Each winner received \$200 in cash along with the award.
