I Am Un-American By Lyla Miklos Letter to CNN July 18, 2002

Last night I was flipping the dial on my boob tube and stopped when I hit CNN. I usually avoid watching CNN – a station I have dubbed the 24 Hour US Propaganda Network – at all costs. Still, the words "Misunderstood Martina: Navratilova Labeled UnAmerican for Criticizing Bush Government" both horrified, shocked and titillated me. Not because I was appalled that someone could be deemed UnAmerican, but that criticizing your government would automatically categorize you as UnAmerican.

In a short, but mind numbingly loathsome interview by Connie Chung, Martina Navratilova was attacked for daring to say: \*

3. "Well, obviously, I'm not saying this is a communist system, but I think we're having -- after 9/11, there's a big centralization of power.

President Bush is having more and more power. John Ashcroft is having more and more power. Americans are losing their personal rights left and right. I mean, the ACLU is up in arms about all of the stuff that's going on right now. .... I certainly didn't mean that I'm here in a communist country and that I can't be what I want to be. However, when it comes to personal freedom as a lesbian, I am getting more squished here than I would be in Europe."

For these perversely self-evident statements Connie Chung said the following to Martina Navratilova: \*

1. "Can I be honest with you? I can tell you that when I read this, I have to tell you that I thought it was un-American, unpatriotic. I wanted to say, go back to Czechoslovakia. You know, if you don't like it here, this a country that gave you so much, gave you the freedom to do what you want."

2. "But you know what? I think it is, OK, if you believe that, you know, then go ahead and think that at home. But why do you have to spill it out? You know, why do you have to talk about it as a celebrity so that people will write it down and talk about what you said? . . . . . .Got you. But sometimes, when you hear celebrities saying something, do you ever say to yourself, I don't care what so and so thinks, you know. Yes, go ahead and say whatever you want to say. But you're not a politician. You're not in a position of government power or whatever."

3. Oh and by the way . . . . if you decide to adopt a child please make sure you call me personally and let me know.
